## Financial Support Resources

### **Emergency grants and loans - non-profit**

- From Community Alliance with Family Farmers (CAFF): <u>California Family Farmer Emergency Fund</u> grants of \$1000 to \$5000 - focusing on smaller farms
- From American Farmland Trust: <u>Farmer Relief Fund</u> grants of \$1000
- From California FarmLink: <u>Emergency loans</u> of up to \$20,000 at 0 interest
- <u>Hello Alice COVID-19 Business Resource Center</u> is offering small business owners and entrepreneurs help and emergency funding. Apply for a \$10,000 Emergency Grant and get help with accessing other funding and assistance.

### **Emergency grants and loans - government**

- US Small Business Administration (SBA):
  - <u>Paycheck Protection Program (PPP)</u> An SBA loan that helps businesses keep their workforce employed during the Coronavirus (COVID-19) crisis. the loan is forgiven if employees are on the payroll after July, 2020 **Farm businesses should apply as soon**

**as possible.** Agricultural enterprises **ARE eligible** to apply for the PPP loan program. Applicants can apply to SBA or any federally insured banking institution including credit unions and the Farm Credit System.

- Economic Injury Disaster Loan Emergency Advance (EIDL) Small business owners in all U.S. states, Washington D.C., and territories are eligible to apply for an Economic Injury Disaster Loan advance of up to \$10,000. This advance will provide economic relief to businesses that are currently experiencing a temporary loss of revenue. Funds will be made available following a successful application. This loan advance will not have to be repaid. **Important:** Agricultural producers are not eligible for EIDL, but agritourism businesses that contribute a significant part of revenue, restaurants, farmers' markets and other farm support businesses may be included.
- Apply for EIDL and \$10,000 Emergency Advance
- More federal relief coming soon. Info from CAFF: <a href="https://www.caff.org/covid19policyupdate/">https://www.caff.org/covid19policyupdate/</a> "The \$9.5 billion is being divvied up by USDA this week and should be announced on Friday. CAFF has joined with NSAC, NFU, NYFC to ask for \$1 billion for local food producers. It is likely that local food payments would be made through FSA offices and that farmers would have to demonstrate that direct sales are a significant share of their business and that they lost markets. The details of the documentation are still being worked out."
- Unemployment Insurance for businesses and the self-employed: The CA EDD has launched a new Pandemic Unemployment Assistance page to keep you informed of eligibility requirements and the around-the-clock effort to build this new program from the CARES Act. This complex program to serve those who don't usually qualify for regular Unemployment Insurance (UI) benefits, including businesses and the self-employed, has to be developed and could rival the size of the current UI program EDD administers for unemployed workers.

## For U-Pick Operations & Roadside Stands



**U-Pick operations during COVID-19** 

The fruit is almost ready or already ripe; U-Pick farmers all over California are considering if and how to open while keeping customers, workers & family safe.

Ken Hagan, stone fruit grower and board member of <u>Harvest</u> <u>Time in Brentwood</u>, reports mixed feelings about how his U-Pick operation and those of his fellow Harvest Time members will work this year. Hagan's family is reluctant to invite the normal crowds of visitors to the popular family farm. He is developing a new strategy, maybe with no U-Pick option at all, offering only prepacked fruit with an online ordering system. Or perhaps U-Pick regulated by a reservations system or a headcount limit on customers, strict sanitation and a distancing check-out process. The plan changes every day. Ken Hagan is willing to chat with other U-Pick operators about planning, <u>ken@brentwoodfruit.com</u>

Although California Dept. of Food and Agriculture (CDFA) has not shared any specific guidelines for U-Pick operations, they give the following information and recommend that farmers check with their county Public Health Department for additional guidance: <u>Sales of pre-bagged fruit and Best Practices</u> Food supply: Critical Infrastructure
