The UC Agriculture and Natural Resources (ANR) Small Farm Program and our partners at the <u>CDFA Division of Fairs and Exhibitions</u> are almost finished with our first round of workshops at county and district fairs.

These workshops, held during fair time, are for farmers, agricultural and tourism

professionals and community leaders to learn about innovations linking farmers with county and district fairs and to discuss ideas for collaboration with fair organizers. Ideas shared at these workshops are the basis for an exciting new round of collaborative projects and specialty crop promotions planned for next year's fair season.

- At the Ventura County Fair, Evy Young showed off the Orange County Fair's Centennial Farm, a 3.5 acre working farm on the fairgrounds

- Marin County Fair partnered with UC Cooperative Extension and local farmers' market organizers, Agricultural Institute of Marin, to



California Cottage Foods Bill signed into law

About the bill

The governor of California recently signed a new bill allowing and regulating some processing and selling of home-made (and farm-house kitchen produced) foods direct to the consumer without having to go through a commercial USDA certified kitchen. This may have a significant (good) impact on many small to medium sized growers in the state who wish to sun-dry fruits & veggies, bottle honey, jams and jellies, bake fruit pies, roast coffee, make granola, and more.

Implementing the Homemade Food Act - From County Environmental Health Here is a message from Brad Banner, Butte County Environmental Health Director:



"Just so you know... a lot of discussion is taking place among the regulatory community about implementation of the new law. Some county health folks are suggesting that implementation needs to be delayed until California Department of Public Health (CDPH) gets their website updated with a list of approved cottage foods and establishes their food processor class. Meanwhile, CDPH is seeking 6 new positions out of the bill in order from them to do their

part, presumably to be funded by a surcharge on permit and registration fees. You get the picture.

So while all this is swirling around, it is important for each of you to stay engaged with your local health department, track what is happening regarding implementation of the new law, and remain vigilant so as to assure timely implementation of the new law in your own community."
